#### **TUESDAY, MARCH 13, 2018**

#### Welcome & Administrative

Fassett called the meeting to order at 2:03 PM Central Time and the group proceeded with introductions. Farnsworth thanked the group for all the empathy, kind words, and support related to the passing of Jerry Kenny. Fassett offered his thanks to the EDO for how they handled the situation and helped to keep the Program moving forward smoothly.

#### Agenda modifications:

- PRRIP First Increment Extension discussion will be today.
- PRRIP Water Action Plan Projects update will be earlier today.
- Platte River Invasive Species Management discussion will be tomorrow.

GC Decision – LaBonde moved to approve the December 05, 2017 GC Quarterly Meeting minutes and the March 01, 2018 Executive Session Conference Call minutes; Ament seconded. Minutes approved.

### PRRIP Executive Director's Office (EDO)

Fassett discussed recent conversations among the Signatories with how best to handle the transition of leadership in the EDO in light of the passing of Jerry Kenny. Ament offered comments on the plan moving forward and expressed his gratitude to the EDO for quickly developing a very good plan for moving forward. Thabault said the Service fully supports the plan moving forward. Beardsley said they have great faith in Farnsworth, Smith, and the EDO moving forward and fully support it.

GC Decision – Ament moved to approve the PRRIP Signatories recommendation to accept Headwaters Corporation's Internal Option for the PRRIP EDO and appoint Jason Farnsworth PRRIP Executive Director (ED) and Chad Smith PRRIP Deputy Executive Director (DED); Taddicken seconded. Motion approved.

GC Decision – LaBonde moved to approve the FY18 EDO Contract Addendum; Thabault seconded. Motion approved.

#### **Program Committee Updates**

82 Land Advisory Committee (LAC)

Czaplewski provided an update on the latest LAC activities. The LAC has not met since the last GC meeting but will be meeting soon.

#### Water Advisory Committee (WAC)

Steinke provided an update on the latest WAC activities. The WAC met via conference call on February 6. Discussion topics included: water leasing on Central's system for irrigators; Cottonwood Ranch broadscale recharge; Elwood recharge modeling; Central Platte NRD water transfers; project scores; and AEM imagery to help with slurry walls. Steinke is the 2018 WAC Chair.

### Technical Advisory Committee (TAC)

- Baasch provided an update on the latest TAC activities. The TAC met via conference call on January 29.
- 94 Discussion topics included: tabled nomination of the 2018 TAC chair; approved the 2017 tern/plover
- monitoring report; approved the 2017 spring whooping crane monitoring report; new Program publications;
- updates on Program water projects and the new Program website and database.



#### 97 Finance Committee (FC)

LaBonde said the FC had not met since the last GC meeting. The FC met via conference call on February 1. The FC took four actions: approved the 2018 ISAC member contract amendments; approved a channel reactivation bid package for the choke point; approved 2018 Program land spraying bid package; and approved a contract amendment for RTi related to the Program website and database.

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### PRRIP FY18 Budget and Work Plan

Farnsworth discussed the status of the FY18 budget. LaBonde said with regard to the Extension, it relies upon First Increment carryover funds to complete work during the Extension.



### U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Report

Rabbe provided an update on 2017 Tiered Consultations. Ament asked about Colorado consultations. Rabbe said the OMAD missile project is the main one, it is a Department of Defense road project. Urie asked about depletions that do not fit under the existing MOA. Rabbe said those are for projects largely in 2008 and maybe into 2009 before the MOA was finalized. Econopouly said he would find out more details and get back to Colorado.

#### PRRIP Water Action Plan (WAP) Projects

Werbylo and Engelbert provided an update on the Cottonwood Ranch broad-scale recharge (BSR) project. Farnsworth discussed the status of agreements with NPPD (land use) and CNPPID (pipeline Water Service Agreement) to move the BSR project forward. The EDO is working on revised language for both agreements with the hope that both can be presented to the GC soon.

Strauch asked about the estimated cost per acre foot for BSR. Werbylo said the current estimated cost for the full project is roughly \$3 million. Shadle asked when final plans would be wrapped up. Engelbert said likely by the end of this month. Werbylo said the EDO and HDR are working with Central to get specifics about pipeline-related costs. Barels asked if the pipeline and berms are designed for icing conditions. Engelbert said everything will be designed with icing conditions in mind. Farnsworth said the largest uncertainty is the infiltration rate so over the next 2-3 years we will be developing and adjusting operational plans based on learning from operation.

Werbylo gave a short update on the slurry wall project. Fassett asked about the cost. Werbylo said the \$7 million estimated construction cost is just for the single project at Lakeside.

### **PRRIP 2016 State of the Platte**

Smith provided a summary of the 2016 State of the Platte. Discussion topics included:

- Changes to the format of the document, including addition of a Glossary, listing of Program publications, and a summary of progress toward the Land and Water milestones.
- Plans to move the State of the Platte more to a living document through the Program website.
- Big Question #5 Group discussion about the question focusing on whooping crane selection of habitat in proportion to its availability, data analysis showing a disproportionate selection for unobstructed channel width of around 650 feet and unforested width of around 1,100 feet, implications for Program management, and determining a process for getting to "Adjust" in the adaptive management cycle for this Big Question.

#### **PRRIP Publications & Peer Review**

Thabault said the Service supports publication of Chapters 2 and 3 and the EDO response to the Alexander et al. "Letter to the Editor" but wants the meeting minutes to reflect that the Program publications do not necessarily represent the Service's positions on all the issues discussed in those publications.

**GC Decision** – Czaplewski moved to approve publication of Whooping Crane Habitat Synthesis Chapters 2 and 3; Beardsley seconded. <u>Publication approved.</u>

**GC Decision** – Czaplewski moved to approve publication of the EDO response to Alexander et al.; Labonde seconded. <u>Publication approved.</u>



#### **PRRIP First Increment Extension**

Merrill discussed the status of the NEPA process for the Extension. There is a Draft Environmental Assessment (EA) now on the street for public review and there are several public open houses to allow for input on the document. A formal request for consultation went out to the Service last week and we should still be on schedule for a FONSI in September of this year. Rabbe said formal consultation began on March 7 and there is a 30-day period for the Service to respond to the request from Reclamation. After that, there is a 90-day period to write the draft Biological Opinion and then there is a 135-day period for consultation on the Final Biological Opinion. Thabault said the draft BO will be shared with the federal agency and we may need to have some discussion with Reclamation as to whether we can share the draft BO with the GC for review and comment.

LaBonde said the states came together last fall with a proposal to extend the Program by 13 years. As part of that, there is a water project called the Pathfinder Proposal (16,507 acre-feet) which adds the uses of environment, fisheries, and wildlife to an irrigation use (below Guernsey and above Lake McConaughy). The project requires Congressional authorization and it would be best to put this in the same legislation as the Extension. Three conditions would have to be met: 1) a change of use (state water right issue in Wyoming); 2) approval by Wyoming legislature under export statues; 3) Nebraska would have to issue a permit to protect that water from the state line to McConaughy. Some folks in the Upper North Platte had concerns about this project. LaBonde held a series of public meetings in Wyoming to discuss this issue. There is broad support from Wyoming water users to extend the Program, but water users from the Upper North Platte want protections for their water use in the federal legislation. The suggestion that has come up is to have the federal legislation ask Reclamation to petition for a no-call provision on this water right. LaBonde will be talking to the Wyoming Governor soon about this proposed language and at that point he can talk to Colorado, Nebraska, and the Wyoming Congressional delegation about the issues.

### **WEDNESDAY, MARCH 14, 2018**

### **Welcome and Administrative**

Fassett called the meeting to order at 8:02 AM Central Time and the group proceeded with introductions.

### **Platte River Invasive Species Management**

Walters discussed funding for Platte River invasive species management. Freeman asked about the status of other funding for this work. Walters discussed the annual contributions of several organizations (CPNRD, TPNRD, NPPD, CNPPID, DU) and pending funding from the State of Nebraska. There are also three pending grants that could provide matching funds. Barels said this is one of the best things the Program can do to keep water moving through the system. LaBonde asked what the total cash need is for this Program. Walters said the goal is \$600,000-\$650,000 with a minimum of about \$400,000; this is out-of-pocket cash that does not include in-kind services. LaBonde said his concern is that the cost share has the Program paying about half of the cost of this effort when it is an issue for the whole river in Nebraska. Merrill said this is a concern for Reclamation as well. Farnsworth said the counties in Nebraska are trying to pool resources to help address this issue and the EDO will continue to push them to do as much as they can to get a handle on this issue. LaBonde said this appears to be a Nebraska issue more so than a Program issue especially when the Program is currently the largest cash contributor. LaBonde asked other funding partners like CNPPID and NPPD if their contributions can be higher.

LaBonde moved to approve the expenditure of \$200,000 of FY18 funds in PRRIP Budget Line Item WP-1(b) for invasive species management in 2018. No second was offered so the motion died.

Thabault said he is concerned about being pennywise and pound foolish and that reducing funding might lead to greater control costs down the road. He supports a motion that keeps Program funding at the level of \$300,000 and that we work to find additional funding sources to alleviate the Program funding burden over time. Runge asked if there is an effort to develop a statewide integrated pest management approach. Walters said not at this time. Taddicken said Audubon has been working with donors to possibly develop a large endowment to work on invasive species management. Barels said one idea is to have the EDO develop a strategy and a cost for putting out an RFQ to hire a commercial applicator to just treat Program lands.

LaBonde asked if there is a phragmites infestation on Program lands. Tunnell said yes and that control efforts for it are not built into regular Program management budget line items but are covered by this effort being discussed.

**GC Decision** – Thabault moved to approve the expenditure of \$300,000 in FY18 funds in PRRIP Budget Line Item WP-1(b) for invasive species (phragmites) management and to direct the EDO and related funding partners to work more aggressively to help find additional funding sources; Miller seconded. Motion approved.

Merrill said it is important for Walters to discuss with the other funding partners for this work that the PRRIP funding Signatories are getting frustrated with the level of funding coming from the Program and there is a desire to reduce the Program's funding share to something closer to past levels (\$200,000).

### **PRRIP Land Management**

Tunnell discussed the 2017 Land Work Report. Freeman asked about LP-2 and what is meant by AM Species Habitat Actions. Farnsworth said this means actions like channel widening and other actions that are separate from regular land operations.



#### **Public Comment**

Fassett asked for public comment. None offered.

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### **Executive Session**

Beardsley moved to enter Executive Session; Ament seconded. GC entered Executive Session at 8:58 AM Central Time.

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Ament moved to end Executive Session; Strauch seconded. GC ended Executive Session at 10:05 AM Central Time.

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## **PRRIP Executive Session Motions**

GC Decision – Miller moved to authorize the EDO to seek appraisal of Tract W201601 for possible disposal; Ament seconded. Motion approved.
