1 Welcome & Administrative

- 2 Ament called the meeting to order at 12:00 PM Central Time and Smith proceeded with a roll call.
- 3

4 North Platte Choke Point Test Flow

Farnsworth gave a short update on the status of discussions regarding issues related to indemnification and 5 insurance. Ament asked for clarification of who was discussing indemnification issues. Farnsworth said he 6 is working with Brundage and Central legal counsel to get clarification and revised language that would 7 then be presented to State of Colorado and Colorado Water User GC representatives to discuss next steps. 8 Ament and Freeman agreed. Smith discussed the status of planning for the test flow. Ament said he thinks 9 postponement until next year would be wise. Rabbe said there was severe flooding in central Nebraska 10 (Wood River) so there are many landowners and homeowners that did experience flooding in and around 11 the Associated Habitat Reach and we are very sensitive to this recovery and repair. There is always scrutiny 12 with releases so from our perspective there is the potential for backlash to the test flow, even if unwarranted. 13 The Service believes any release this year in particular will come with a high degree of sensitivity and there 14 is not a lot of appetite within the Service for doing the test flow this year. Fassett agreed with those 15 comments and things waiting a year will be wise. Brundage agreed. Citta said NPPD would support a delay. 16 Mead said Wyoming is on the same page as everyone else. Miller said he supports delaying for a year as 17 well. Ament asked if it is OK to continue working on issues like indemnification even if the test flow is 18 delaved for a year. Brundage said Central is committed to finishing the indemnification/insurance issue and 19 the rest of the GC agreed. 20

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GC Decision – The GC concurred with delaying the choke point test flow for a year.

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Rabbe discussed the EA and the status of potential EA releases the remainder of this year. The Service 24 believes it will need to release some water, likely at the end of summer or in the fall, to avoid debits to the 25 EA for not using water and then being re-set to 100,000 acre-feet. The Service is continuing to wrestle with 26 this issue. Steinke said he has a gut feeling that the Service may see "free" flows of a similar magnitude to 27 the test flows because of the snowpack and the forecast for wet weather. The re-set, if any, would be small 28 and there will be a lot of water moving through the system anyway because there is so much water that is 29 going to have to move downstream. Farnsworth said we may do some internal planning to capture any 30 possible results of natural flow events moving through the choke point and other parts of the system that 31 may occur as a result of the expected high spring inflows. 32 33

34 Future Meetings & Closing Business

Ament said it appears that Sen. Barrasso from Wyoming will be the primary sponsor of the Extension legislation and the bill is likely to be introduced and hearings held after the April Congressional recess. Strauch asked if anyone on the House side would introduce a companion bill and Ament said not at this point. La said she talked to Rep. Perlmutter's office and Rep. Neguse's office (both from Colorado) and they are both briefed on the subject

- Fassett wondered if anyone had comments about the spring migration. Rabbe said it looks to be a slightly later start to the migration than in past years because of weather-related issues, but what he has gathered is that the birds we have seen have been staying in Nebraska with the snow line still being in southern South Dakota. No whooping crane sightings so far in the Dakotas but there have been observations on the Platte in several places. Baasch said the current Platte count is eight (8) birds so far. Barron said Rowe and the
- 46 Crane Trust have been impacted by road closures due to flooding and mud. They have had numerous blind
- reservations canceled and it will impact them financially.
